

American Indian /Alaskan Natives

have the right to:

If you are involuntarily committed, you have additional rights

- Receive behavioral health services from a Tribal behavioral health program
- Traditional/cultural treatment services in addition to or instead of standard services.
- Be treated with respect and dignity.
- Have your privacy protected.
- Help develop a plan of care and services that meet your needs.
- Participate in decisions regarding your behavioral health care.
- Receive services in a barrier-free location (accessible).
- Request information about names, locations, phone numbers, and languages for local agencies.
- Receive the amount and duration of services you need.
- Request information about the structure and operation of the North Sound BHO.
- Receive services within 2 hours for emergent care and 24 hours for urgent care.
- Be free from the use of seclusion and restraints.
- Receive age and culturally appropriate services.
- Be provided a certified interpreter and translated material at no cost to you.
- Understand available treatment options and alternatives.
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- Refuse any proposed treatment.
- Receive care that does not discriminate against you (e.g., age, race, type of illness).
- Be free of any sexual exploitation or harassment.
- Receive an explanation of all medication prescribed and possible side effects.
- Make an advance directive, which states your choices and preferences for behavioral health care.
- Receive quality services that are medically necessary.
- Have a second opinion from a behavioral health professional.
- File a grievance with your agency or North Sound BHO.
- File an appeal based on a PIHP written Notice of Action (for Medicaid enrollees).
- Choose a behavioral health care provider or choose one for your child who is under thirteen years of age.
- Change behavioral health care providers during the first 30 days, and on occasion thereafter.
- File a request for an administrative (fair) hearing.
- Request and receive a copy of your medical records and ask for changes.
- Be free from retaliation.
- Request North Sound BHO and Community Behavioral Health Agency policies and procedures as they pertain to your rights.

North Sound Behavioral Health Organization

All Tribal members in the North Sound Region (Island, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish, and Whatcom County) are eligible for crisis mental health services from the North Sound Behavioral Health Organization (North Sound BHO). Tribal members who receive (or are eligible to receive) Medicaid with a BHO benefit are financially eligible for all the behavioral health services offered by North Sound BHO contract providers. Tribal members without a BHO benefit who wish to access BHO services can request a BHO benefit by contacting Provider One at 800-562-3022.

According to Federal and State law, as well as North Sound BHO Contract, contracted providers must inform American Indian/Alaska Native clients that they may receive traditional/cultural treatment services in addition to OR instead of standard services. Providers are also encouraged to coordinate treatment of Tribal members with Tribal Behavioral Health/Human Services Departments. This will require the provider to obtain a signed authorization from the client.

Collaboration with Tribes helps assure that American Indian/Alaska Native clients receive culturally appropriate services. It also assures that client history is considered and that a Tribe knows to prepare for follow-up treatment and support of one of its members. Collaboration with Tribes gives American Indian/Alaska Native clients greater opportunities for recovery.

American Indian/Alaskan Native concerns about services received through the North Sound Behavioral Health Organization

Any American Indian/Alaska Native who is not satisfied with the services she/he or a family member receives from any North Sound BHO provider is encouraged to contact the North Sound Regional Ombuds. All concerns are strictly confidential. Ombuds will contact the North Sound BHO provider to find a solution that satisfies the client. If a client is not satisfied, Ombuds will file a grievance for the client.

Ombuds is independent of the North Sound BHO and all its contract providers. By law, no one may interfere with Ombuds or the client, and retaliation of any kind is illegal.
